

Nutrition of School Lunches May Face Less Regulation from Gov't

Do you enjoy the current lunches the school provides, even if some are not the healthiest possible choices?

Because of a new bill from Congress, your school lunch choices aren't going to be getting any healthier anytime soon.

The new bill, which was released 14 November, would decrease the limitations on serving potatoes in the lunch line. It would also allow pizza sauce to be counted as a vegetable. Many people consider this similar to the Reagan administration's attempt to classify ketchup as a vegetable to cut costs 30 years ago.

Meals served by schools that are supported by the federal government must contain a certain amount of vegetables, explaining some of the attempts to classify these foods as vegetables by Congress.

These proposals are based on recommendations made in 2009 by the Institute of Medicine. The proposal was made by Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack with the intention of cutting down childhood obesity.

This recent bill could become a big concern for health officials. Experts believe that unhealthy school lunches are the main cause for childhood obesity, and they're probably right. Obesity rates in recent years have more than doubled for infants aged two to five, and they have more than tripled for adolescents aged twelve to nineteen.

These restrictions would also unravel recent efforts by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) to make school lunches healthier. The USDA was hoping to raise standards for school lunches, which included restrictions on sodium. They also wanted to boost the use of whole grains and limit the use of potatoes at the lunch line.

Like it or not, the bill creating these school lunch changes will come into effect. Despite many efforts by the Obama administration and the USDA to make healthier school lunches, it looks like efforts will be in vain.

The program involves mainly eleventh and twelfth grade students from the high school. They focus on improving language arts skills such as letter recognition, sounds, rhyming, blending, and eventually reading, as well as some math skills such as counting and adding.

"I think the mentoring program is wonderful for both my students and the high school students," Berger said. "My kindergarteners love to see their mentors, and the high school students get a taste of what it would be like to work with five- and six-year-olds and the challenges that come with that. I believe it gives both age groups self-confidence."

Senior Margariete Malenda is one of the student leaders of the mentoring program this year. She has been involved with the program since her freshman year, when she began to see teaching as a potential career path.

"There is a great group of mentors this year, they are very enthusiastic. They show potential to be leaders for next year's program," said Malenda. "The program changes every year due to the number of elementary students and the cooperation of the mentors and teacher."

The mentoring program provides the kindergarten students with extra help by having an older student with whom to communicate. The benefits are immeasurable for both Berger's kindergarten class and the participating students of FAHS.

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ing's iconic locations.


"It's a beautiful venue, and I'm really excited to [have prom] there," Alyssa Delp said.

Tax Jump Expected in Fleetwood

Residents of Fleetwood Borough may have something new to dread next year in the form of an 83% tax increase, an idea the Borough Council decided to advertise on Monday, 14 November

This increase is for a proposed 2012 budget that will total over \$1.9 million.

The tax, if it makes it farther than the advertising phase, will raise the property tax rate \$2.5 million, including a \$1 million fire tax. According to the council, the hike is necessary because of a \$33,600 budget increase due to raised salaries, insurance, and utilities expenses.

Some council members are saying this budget is required to keep the same level of service expected by residents of Fleetwood and that this increase will be well in line with rates of similar-sized boroughs in the region.

In an article for the Reading Eagle, Councilman Peter R. Merkel spoke openly about the tax increase.

"I pay more for cable TV than I do for borough taxes, and what do you get for your borough taxes? A [heck] of a lot," Merkel said.

Not all council members are in favor of this drastic increase. Councilwoman Tammy L. Gore said she would not have a problem advertis ing the budget but is opposed to the budget itself. By Leif Greiss

Heffner and Students Online Piracy Begin FAHS's First Economic Challenge

Economic Challenge is something that has never been a part of FAHS before this year. As with most new clubs, not many are involved or even know about it. Dina Heffner, Economics teacher at FAHS, started the club to help both seniors taking Economics and those who are just fans of the topic.

"Economic Challenge is a national competition in which high school seniors answer questions to show their knowledge of economic-related topics," Heffner said.

"I just wanted to do it for fun," Senior Caleb Tanner, 1 of only 3 members of Economic Challenge, said.

The competitions are usually held in Lancaster, PA, sometime in March. In the first part of the challenge, Rounds I-III, individual students take a series of 20minute tests consisting of fifteen fiveoption multiple choice questions.

The content covered in Rounds I through III is as follows: Round I - Microeconomics, Round II - Macroeconomics, and Round III - International Economics and Current Events.

In the second part of the Challenge, Round IV, students are divided up into teams of 4. In this round, students work together to answer another set of fifteen questions.

"Any senior enrolled in a college prep. Economic class may be in the group, and practices are Tuesdays after school," Heffner, the one and only advisor of the Economic Challenge team, said.

"We meet weekly to work as a team to go over new concepts. Mrs. Heffner goes over them, but most of the time we are by ourselves," Matt Qualio, another member of the Economic Chal-

A new bill introduced on 26 October 2011 has recently been passed. Though the bill was still open to changes, it took effect on 15 December.

The SOPA Bill (Stop Online Piracy Act) will expand the ability of law enforcement and copyright holders to fight online trafficking and counterfeit goods as well as infringement. Infringement is a breach or infraction, as of law, right, obligation, violation, or transgression.

This bill would also make unauthorized streaming of copyrighted material a felony with a minimum of a five-year jail sentence. Many people complain that this bill will cripple the Internet and will counter the first amendment right to free speech.
