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Boston Marathon Bombings Break Hearts Nationwide

Every year, thousands of dedicated runners take the trip to Massachusetts to run the Boston Marathon on Patriot's day. In fact, it's the oldest annual city marathon in the world.

Many spectators moved about frantically to find a spot to watch loved ones and friends cross the finish line, but none of them were prepared for what was to come this year.

At 2:50 p.m. on Monday, 15 April 2013, while almost 6,000 runners were still making their way to the finish line, two bombs detonated 12 seconds apart, taking the lives of 8-year-old Martin Richard, 29-year-old Krystle Campbell, and a Chinese

national who remains unnamed.

“It made me cry when I heard about it,” senior Emily Kelly said.

The blast not only left three dead but 170 others injured. Over 20 of them were in critical condition.

At first, many of the runners thought the bombs were the sounds of cannons going off to congratulate them on passing the finish line, but they soon realized something was terribly wrong.

Many had the initial instinct to run, which is what most people would do; however, many others became heroes that day when they put their own safety in jeopardy to help those in need.

“It was really touching to hear about the people who put the ones who were hurt first. That's who the true heroes were that day,” senior Veronika Kraft said.

Monday, 15 April, is a day that left many heartbroken by the loss of friends and family, and many others will need time to recover from the physical and emotional damage this attack left upon them.

Two brothers from Chechnya are suspected of the crime based on security camera footage. While the older brother died in a heated shoot-out, the younger brother is hospitalized and in custody.

Every spring and fall, FAHS hosts a generous means of demonstrating kindness and community.

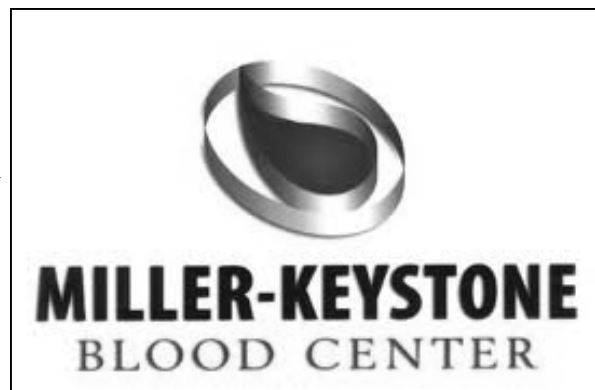
The Miller-Keystone Blood Clinic comes to FAHS for an entire day so that people can donate

heart and a liver awaited him.

Christmas Day, Fry was put into surgery to have a heart and liver transplant. During this procedure, Fry had multiple blood transfusions.

Blood Drive for this spring is in honor of Mr. Fry. He is one of the many people who need donors' help to save lives.

Every two seconds, somebody in the United States needs blood. Every day, Americans need more than 44,000 blood donations. One donation can save up to three peoples' lives.

The blood drive will be in the High School Auxiliary Gym from 7:15 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Any student who is over 17 years of age is allowed to donate blood, but the donating isn't only for students. Any family members, staff

members, or other members of the community are allowed to donate.

Pope Francis: First Pope from the New World

The Catholic Church was shocked when Pope Benedict XVI formally resigned on 28 February 2013.

In fact, their nickname is “God's Marines.” They also take vows of poverty, chastity, and obedience.

Pope Francis will face many challenges in his new job. The Catholic Church has been beset by controversy in the past year, including sexual allegations made against priests.

Francis hopes to breathe some fresh air into the system and clear the somewhat tainted name of the Catholic Church worldwide.

My Chemical Romance Calls it Quits

After twelve years, the Jersey-based band My Chemical Romance announced that, on the 22 March, it has “come to an end.” The band was originally formed by front-man Gerard Way and former drummer Matt Pelissier approximately one week after the 9/11 attacks. In a previous interview, Way stated that witnessing the planes crash into the World Trade center influenced his life to the extent that he decided to start a rock band. Although frequently and most controversially proclaimed an “emo” band, Way previously showed his disagreement in this classification. Within a year, My Chemical Romance, composed of Gerard Way, Ray Toro, Mikey Way, Matt Pelissier, and Frank Lero, were signed to a minor record company producing their debut album, I Brought You My Bullets, You Brought Me Your Love (2002), which they offered as a free download through a sharing site as well as MySpace, where their initial fan base originated. Within the decade, MCR produced three more albums: Three Cheers for Sweet Revenge (2004), The Black Parade (2006), and their most recent, Danger Days: The True Lives of the Fabulous Killjoys (2010). In 2005, My Chemical Romance was nominated for “Best New Artist in a Video,” “Best Rock Video,” and “Best Choreography in a Video” for “Helena” at the MTV Video Music Awards. Although an American originated band, MCR had more achievements in European awards, such as the NME awards in which they won “Best International Band” in 2007 and 2011, “Best Video” for “Na Na Na (Na Na Na Na Na Na Na Na Na)” as well as numerous wins in the Kerrang! Awards held in

the United Kingdom. However, on Saturday 22 March 2013, the band issued a statement on their official website announcing their disbandment. The statement on mychemicalromance.com is shown below: “Being in this band for the past twelve years has been a true blessing. We’ve gotten to go places we never knew we would. We’ve been able to see and experience things we never imagined possible. We’ve shared the stage with people we admire, people we look up to, and best of all, our friends. And now, like all great things, it has come time for it to end. Thanks for all of your support, and for being part of the adventure. —My Chemical Romance” @gerardway tweeted two days after the website announcement confirming the disbanding of the group, and denied that any altercations between band members was the reason for the split. “We were spectacular. Every show I knew this, every show I felt it with or without external confirmation. There were some clunkers, sometimes our secondhand gear broke, sometimes I had no voice—we were still great. It is this belief that made us who we were, but also many other things, all of them vital. And all of the things that made us great were the very things that were going to end us,” Way wrote. So perhaps the romance was strained and the chemical bonds faded out, but as Way said in his closing statement, “My Chemical Romance is done. But it can never die. It is alive in me, in the guys, and it is alive inside all of you. I always knew that, and I think you did too.” *By Brianna Reinstadtler*

German Students Enter Essay Contest

At Fleetwood Area High School, there are several different contests and competitions that allow students to excel in academics and in life.

For German classes, they can excel to places beyond Fleetwood's borders.

Frau Christine Moll, a German teacher working at Fleetwood Area High School, and her students will be competing in an unforgettable contest.

In this contest, students will be writing essays. For these essays, they have two topics from which to choose.

One Topic is "Think Transatlantic." This topic asks students questions about USA and its history with Germany as well as the strong partnership between the two countries in today's world.

The question states, "Germany and the United States remain strong partners in the 21st century. The transatlantic cooperation can be seen in the government, industry, tourism and many other areas. As with any partnership, the future rests in the hands of the youth. What does the German-American relationship mean to you? What will it mean in the future? Are there examples of youth-oriented transatlantic exchanges or partnerships? Will Germany and the United States remain strong partners? What would you do right now to help ensure German-American ties stay strong, now and in the future?"

The Second Topic talks about John F. Kennedy's Speech in Berlin: "This year is the 50th anniversary of the President John F. Kennedy's famous speech in Berlin. "Ich bin ein

Berliner" became a phrase heard around the world and the speech underlined American support for West Berlin. The short speech was seen as a turning point in the Cold War. Does this speech still have meaning in today's world? Are we all still Berliners? What does world citizenship mean today?"

Head Coach of Rutgers Fired for Abusing Players

On 3 April, disturbing video clips were released to the public showing Rutgers basketball coach Mike Rice physically and verbally abusing his players during practice.

ESPN aired the video clips, which depicted Mike Rice throwing basketballs at his players and also yelling at them and pushing them. Also on the video, viewers could also see Jimmy Martelli shouting homosexual slurs and pushing players.

The videos were brought to the athletic director, Tim Perneti, in December, but he was only suspended three games and fined \$50,000 dollars.

After the video was shown on ESPN, the next day the University fired head coach Mike Rice.

The community and school were in awe of what was going on at their school. Jimmy Martelli, the other culprit, resigned on the same day.

Athletic director, Tim Perneti, and senior vice president, John Wolf, also resigned with pressure on the school to fire them for only giving Mike Rice a suspension and not firing him right away.



Coaches are known to yell at their players to pump them up or discipline them, but Mike Rice went completely over the line. Yelling homosexual slurs, pushing, and throwing basketballs at players is absolutely uncalled for.

When sportscaster Jim Rome asked NBA All-Star Kobe Bryant about Mike Rice, he responded by saying, "I

probably would have smacked the [heck] out of him. It probably wouldn't have been the best way to react, but I definitely would have done it."

"I've been yelled at by coaches before, but never anything that serious. I would not be able to play for someone who abuses his players like that. Mike Rice doesn't deserve to coach another team ever," senior Micah Storms said.

On 18 April, Rutgers University signed Eddie Jordan to be the next coach of the Scarlet Knights. Jordan has a lot of coaching experience with the Sacramento Kings, Washington Wizards, and the Philadelphia 76ers. Jordan played for Rutgers from 1973-1977 and hopes to turn around his alma mater's team.

Jackie Robinson

was the first African-American to play baseball in the MLB. On 15 April 1947, he played his first game for the Brooklyn Dodgers. This broke racial segregation in baseball that forced African-Americans to play only in the Negro Leagues for six decades.

Jackie Robinson faced a lot of racism and diversity while playing baseball before the civil rights movement.

Robinson not only contributed to the civil rights movement; he also was an outstanding baseball player. Jackie Robinson was a 6 time all-star, a Rookie of the Year award winner in 1947, and an MVP award winner in 1949.

He also led the Brooklyn Dodgers to win the 1955 World Series.

Robinson made a huge impact on baseball, which is why he was elected to the Baseball Hall of Fame in 1962. Even though he died in 1972, every team in the MLB retired number 42 in 1997.

The MLB has also made 15 April Jackie Robinson day. On this day, every player that is playing wears the number 42.

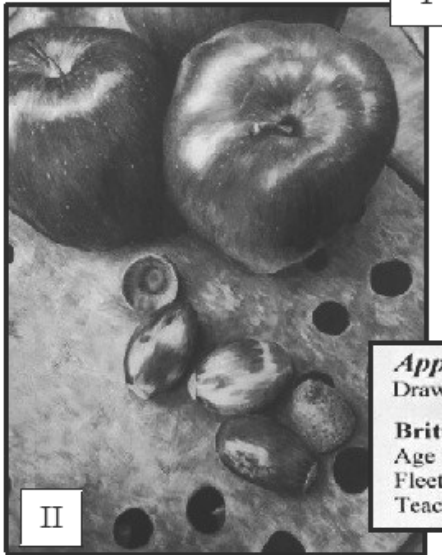
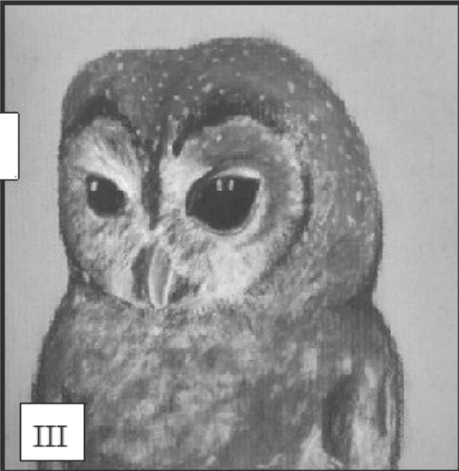
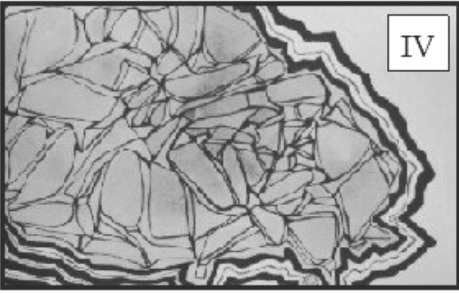
"Jackie Robinson's story is very inspirational. Being a baseball fan, I definitely plan on going to see it", senior Zach Noll said.

The Dominican Republic, Puerto Rico, Venezuela, and Spain were in Pool B, which played its games in San Juan. The Dominican Republic and Puerto Rico moved on to the next round.

The United States, Mexico, Canada, and Italy were part of Pool D, which played its games in Phoenix, Arizona. USA and Italy moved on to the semifinals in Miami, Florida.

"I enjoy watching baseball, so I will probably try and catch a few USA games. I believe the Dominican Republic will win; they're just too good," senior Dan Judy said.

"I love watching USA play, but I believe the Dominican Republic will win. They have too much offensive firepower," senior Micah Storms said.
