century Germany. They gained their popubread houses brought them to the library


larity after the Grimm brothers wrote their famous story, "Hansel and Gretel."

Parisian Attacks Open Door to Terrorism

Syria: A Nation In Turmoil

The once populated nation of Syria is currently in turmoil after a four-year civil war. Syria is currently under the strict control of Bashar al-Assad and has been governed by the Assad name since 1970.

Protests against the dictatorial leadership by Assad resulted in a full scale rebellion. These protests quickly turned violent due to the Government regime responding to these once peaceful gatherings with gunfire and chemical weapons. In the midst of atrocities, the Free-Syrian Army was created. It was made to withstand the overpowering governance of Al-Assad and the government.

The media and mass public knows the FSA (Free-Syrian Army) as the rebels opposing their government leaders. The civil war is much more than that. Along with the almost daily warfare between the FSA and the regime, there is also involvement by the terrorist group known as ISIL, or ISIS.

There is currently a bloody fight for territory in Syria, and most of it is over the Capital, Damascus. What was once a populated urban center is now frequently barrel bombed by Al-Assad and an utterly destroyed reflection of what it once looked like.

"It's awful that citizens of Syria are now living in an open battlefield," senior Dan Shomper said.

As of September 2015, Al-Assad and the FSA each only control about 25% of territory in Syria while ISIS

controls the other 50%. What was once a civil war resulting from corrupt politics is now a bloodbath between three equally violent and politically outspoken groups of individuals.

The involvement by other countries, particularly the United States, is quite precarious due to the chance of giving weapons and supplies to future enemies, such as ISIS, who are not only attacking in Syria but have threatened the well-being of Americans in our own

Along with the predicament of supplying ISIS, various groups within the FSA are splinter cells of the notorious terrorist group, AL-Qaeda. The last thing the U.S. government would want to get publicity for is to be giving weapons to those who had previously terrorized its own cities.

Paris Left In State Of Emergency


The Eiffel Tower stood dark on 13 November 2015. Paris needed time to absorb the deadliest violence since World War II. Gunmen and suicide bombers attacked across Paris, killing at least 265 innocent victims as well as injuring 352 bystanders.

There were a total of seven attacks by at least seven terrorists. All seven were wearing suicide vests. The first two attacks happened in Stade De France, only four miles apart, just after 9:20 p.m. local time. The next attack opened fire on Petit Cambodge restaurant in Rue Bichat and Le Carillon bar on just the other side of the road, killing at least fifteen people enjoying their Friday night out.

"That is awful to hear about. I can't even imagine how scary it was for the people in the restaurant being shot at," junior Pierre Richard said.

After that came Rue De La Fontaine Au Roi when the same group of terrorists drove 500 yards to the Casa Nostra Pizzeria and opened fire on the diners, killing a minimum of fifteen people. Shortly after that happened, the attackers moved to La Belle Equipe bar in Rue De Charonne and murdered nineteen people around 9:35 p.m.

"I'm not exactly sure what I would've done in that situation, but it is a very scary situation to be in. I hope everyone there is able to move on with their daily lives after this all has happened to them. I am sure they were traumatized," senior Hannah Sell said.



"You wouldn't know where they were or who you were safe around in the concert hall," Richard said.

Two militants blew up explosive vests around 12:30 a.m., and the third militant along with them was shot down by officers. There was a third and final blast near Stade De France, and, although no one was killed during the seventh attack, it traumatized everyone in the area.

San Bernardino Creates Fear of Homegrown Terrorists

Following the devastating terror attacks that occurred in Paris, western countries have become concerned about the increased risk of terrorism on the home front. Now it would seem this was a rightful fear to have because a shocking act of terrorism occurred in San Bernardino, California. This gruesome fear confirmed America's worst fears of radicalization right at home.

The perpetrators were husband and wife, Syed Farook and Tashfeen Malik. Following the drop-off of their six-month-old daughter at a relative's house, they proceeded to enact their plan of attack. Each armed with an Ar-15 assault- style rifle and a handgun, they enacted the worst American mass shooting since the 14 December 2012 shooting of Sandy Hook Elementary.

Syed and Malik stormed the Inland Regional Center during a San Bernardino County Department of Public Health employee Holiday party; around eighty people were in attendance. The shooters executed their plans with deadly accuracy, killing fourteen partygoers and resulting in twenty-one injuries.

According to the official report fol-

lowing the massacre, Farook and Malik fled the scene of the crime in a black SUV, which was traced back to Farook because he rented the car recently. In the aftermath of a highspeed pursuit and a brief shootout, both perpetrators lay dead.

An investigation following-up on the shooters discovered that the woman had recently pledged her allegiance to the leader of ISIS or ISIL, Abu Bakr al-Baghdadi. This discovery confirmed that the shooting was indeed an act of terrorism. ISIS also claimed them as "supporters" of the cause. Obama issued a statement offering his condolences to the injured and families of the victims.

Obama identified the San Bernardino shooting as "an act of terrorism designed to kill innocent people."

He was also very deliberate in his speech against ISIS, denouncing the group in multiple ways and trying to calm the fears of the American people, saying, "We will prevail by being strong and smart, resilient and relentless."

FAHS Graduation to Keystone Hall at KU

the graduating class of 2016 will have its graduation at Kutztown University. Graduation has been a growing concern within Fleetwood. In the past, it has been held in the auditorium with overflow seats being provided in the gymnasium, where the ceremony was projected on screens.

The ceremony will be held in the Keystone Hall. The main gymnasium is able to hold 4,000 people. After the ceremony, graduates will move to the O'Pake Fieldhouse, where they can meet with friends, family members, and teachers.



The size of the class of 2016 compared to that of previous classes happens to be one of the main reasons why this decision was made. There are around 250 people in the class of 2016, which is a substantially larger amount than in previous classes.

The major concern of the class was the amount of tickets each student would receive for seats. In previous years, students received about 4-7 tickets and were allowed unlimited overflow in the gymnasium. With

Unlike any other class at Fleetwood, the current number of students in the high school venue, each student would only get 3-4 tickets and would still have unlimited seating within the gymnasium.

Now that the location has moved to KU, seating will no longer be a problem. Students now receive seven to eight tickets as compared to the three to four they would

> have received had the ceremony been held at Fleetwood; however, overflow seating will no longer be available.

This information was presented to the graduating class in a class meeting at the beginning of the school year. Kirby Barnett, class co-adviser, and Principal Stephen

Herman were instrumental in gathering information. Mr. Barnett, along with the class officers, visited KU where they ultimately decided to present the idea to the rest of the class.

Mr. Barnett presented a PowerPoint outlining the details, and the class then voted based on a show of hands. The vote never carried on into a ballot because it was clear that the majority were in favor of KU.

FAHS Graduation Relocation Faces 18% Opposition

Fleetwood Area High School's decision to move its graduation to Kutztown University's gymnasium has been met with overwhelming support, but that support has not been unanimous. Eighteen percent of students said they would prefer to continue the tradition of holding graduation in Fleetwood's gymnasium.

The thought behind the move to Kutztown was to provide students with more tickets. If the

graduation remained at Fleetwood Area High School, students would have only received three tickets due to the large size of the class of 2016. With the move to Kutztown, graduates will now be presented with approximately eight tickets each.

Some students remain skeptical of the move. They see the potential for a hot, overcrowded gym during graduation.

"I think the biggest problem we have is the air conditioning issue. In June, it can get pretty hot and humid, and with a couple thousand people packed into a gym like sardines, it could get very uncomfortable," senior Brett Santos said.

Many other students share this same

concern. There is a worry that Kutztown's gym will be too hot because there is no air conditioning available.

The move to Kutztown seems to be a positive one in the eyes of the majority of the upcoming graduates. Even with the move being well-regarded by the masses, there are bound to be some who do not approve. Regardless, the school will continue with the move, and graduation will be held in Kutztown University's gym, tentatively scheduled for 7 June 2016. This date could change if bad weather pushes back the last day of school.






