The Fleetwood Area School District has experienced changes in its website during the past couple of weeks.



If the student were to score a low grade on the test, he or she could be unable to move on to the next grade.

In problem with these tests is that teachers feel compelled to educate the students specifically on what is tested, to the exclusion of all other relevant information. In other words, the tests can take away time from other subjects, such as history and science, because the general tests are based on math, language, and reading.

> Most schools have administered standardized tests for children at a young age to understand how to take a formal test, but in reality, why are they needed? Children is helpful in a sense. When taking SATs, you are able to pick what test you would like to take, and that is something people should not overlook.

Every test is different as well, and some do not realize that. Reading Teen Allegedly Opened Fire at Game

In York, Pennsylvania, police are searching for a teenager from Reading who allegedly opened fire on two students from WIlliam Penn High School at a football game. One was shot in the back, the other in the midsection. The shooting victims were Darius Allen, 23, of York, and Antwan Jackson, 20.

The suspect 's described by police as a teen who stands 5', 5", tall and weighs approximately 100 pounds.

"This occurred during the fourth quarter of the game against Lancaster's J.P. McCaskey High School on September 9," police said.

Sixteen-year-old Stephon Damien Brown has been ordered to stand trial on more than 2,000 criminal charges. He was charged as an adult with counts of recklessly endangering another person, aggravated assault, possession of a firearm by a minor, and criminal mischief. The U.S. Marshals fugitive task force arrested Brown in Lancaster on 14 October.

He was charged with over 2,000 counts of recklessly endangering another person due to over 2,000 people being at the game. Witnesses say that some of the shots went in the direction of the crowd.

"Brown is also a suspect for several other shootings in York," police said.

The two known victims were last reported to be in stable condition.

"We think that he's an indiscriminate shooter," Lt. Troy Bankert, commander of the city's detective bureau said. He also added that Brown is still believed to have a gun and to be in the York area.

In the wake of the shootings, school officials are considering changes, including moving home football games from Friday nights to noon Saturdays. Those attending the game were kept inside the stadium until officials determined the scene was safe.

Beijing Engulfed in Massive Amounts of Pollution, Smog

Enough people believed the story that someone fired shots into the restaurant, according to the BBC. Clinton also warned, as reported on many news outlets, to be on the lookout for counterfeit news. She cited "Pizzagate" as an example of real world consequences of fake news.


