"To give you a little background on me and why this club was created, this past August, my older brother left to join the Army infantry. Him leaving was one of the hardest things I went through. I felt alone, like I was going to die in high school, and that I had no one to talk to. I confronted Max [Michaela], and I told her about how I was feeling. She told me that there were more people that felt like I did than I thought, so one day we decided that we wanted to bring people together, and show them that they are not alone in this," AFS President Rachel Wagner

All three of them have family overseas. Aside from her active duty brother, Wagner has retired family members in the military. Both her grandfathers (one in the Air Force, the other in Army Intelligence), two of her uncles (one in the Navy, the other Army Special Ops), and her great-grandfather was an Army Ranger.

AFS Treasurer Michaela Ernst's father was in the Army in the field artillery. He drove the MLRS (Multi Launch Rocket System) tank. Ernst's grandfather was in the Army as a communications officer. Ernst also plans on going into the Air Force for engineering.

Vice President Reitnauer's brother is currently stationed out west in the Army; her uncle is deployed (but while she does not know where, she said his brothers in arms call him "techie"). She also has friends who are in the military as well.

"I admire them all so very much. Having family and friends in the military can be a great

blessing. They are incredibly uplifting, and I hope they will inspire others to join the armed forces," Reitnauer said.

On 7 December 2018, Jake Brader came to speak to the club, and according to Reitnauer, Brader discussed the ins and outs of his basic training; he was helpful and informative to everyone in the club.

"He is such an inspiration, and I am very thankful that he spent some time with us on Friday," Reitnauer said.

Every Friday after school, for the entire month of January, AFS will be holding a letter drive in room 205 to write letters to the men and women in the armed forces. Everyone is wel-

After the collision, Gaston lost control of the car and, while attempting to fix the direction his car was traveling, he wound up colliding with a telephone pole. Gaston took the day off

but decided to return to teaching a day or two after the incident. Students could tell something was wrong. Gaston's usual level of excitement for teaching was off, and so were his reflexes. After one day, he went to visit the doctor, where they told him he couldn't return to teaching until he was fully recovered.

The next two months were filled with little technology use and lots of rest.

"I had a serious

concussion and couldn't function mentally. I wasn't allowed to drive and had to go to physical therapy to relearn some brain functions, and that tute was necessary. Mrs. Sherry took over the took a while," Gaston said.

As most of his students know, Gaston loves teaching and would never have voluntarily missed so much class time.

"I honestly missed teaching. I love what I do and thinking about not being able to do that, like before, was something that took me a

little while to realize," Gaston said.

In Gaston's absence, a long-term substidaily classroom operations with the help of Mrs. Candace Hall, who communicated with Gaston at home. Librarian Mr. Kirby Barnett took over grading for all of Gaston's classes.

"The hardest part was jumping in in the middle of the quarter," Barnett said. "I didn't know the expectations of each class, which made

Spix Blue Macaws Extinct in the Wild, Only Alive in Captivity

Deforestation, logging, and the illegal pet trade are just some of the many factors that have played into the extinction of the Spix's Blue Macaw in the wild. This species of bird is just one of eight confirmed Brazilian birds that have gone extinct in this decade alone.

Though things may look bleek for this species, an estimate of 65 to 85 of these birds still live in captivity. With breeding programs and proper conservation tactics, the Spix's Macaw could very well still have a chance.


must happen before they can be successfully reintroduced into the wild. Spix's macaws are killed for their feathers and meat, their habitat destroyed for lumber and housing.

"The last known individual [Spix's macaw] in the wild disappeared in 2001, but searches have been ongoing since then and it is only now that we feel confident enough to classify it as extinct in the wild," report co-author Stuart Butchart said in an ABC News article.

"I find it very sad that these birds have

The extinction of these birds can mainly be traced back to habitat loss and the black market.

"Spix's macaws were first deemed threatened in the 1980s following destruction of their natural habit as well as a robust illegal bird trade. Numbers in the wild had dwindled so dramatically that naturalist Dr. Paul Roth was only able to identify two remaining in their natural environment in 1987," yummypets.com said.

U.S. Troops Return Home from Syria

"After historic victories against ISIS, it's time to bring our great people home!" President Donald Trump said in a Tweet on 19 December

More than 2,000 U.S. troops have returned from Syria, according to USA Today, but Senators from both parties were against the President's decision to withdraw the troops for various

"This will be an internal struggle between the opposition and Assad. Also, many Middle Eastern countries are entering the scene now that the US has decided to leave Syria," science teacher Karen Favata said. "I believe once we pull out of a war, Trump would believe it would show weakness to return."

Critics of President Trump addressed several concerns about U.S. troops leaving Syria to National Public Radio. Firstly, they expressed concern about a revival from ISIS. Secondly, they thought, if US troops withdrew from Syria, then Bashar al-Assad would feel more secure with his

position as Syrian President. They relayed their consternation of Iran and Russia claiming their victory. They also worry about Turkey launching offensives against the Kurds. And lastly, they think the U.S. will be seen as abandoning one of their allies (or violating foreign policy).

"I think it's a grave error. I think our adversaries around the world are going to go to our partners and allies and say, 'You see, America's unreliable," Republican Senator Marco Rubio said in an interview with NPR.org.

"Just because President Trump tweets that he has defeated ISIS doesn't make us safer. The president continues to disregard the advice of his military, diplomatic, and intelligence personnel, who have consistently warned against the action the president seems poised to take," Rhode Island Democrat Senator Jack Reed said in an interview with NPR.org.

Boston Red Sox Win 2018 World Series

On 23 October, the 2018 Major League Baseball World Series Championship began. The Los Angeles Dodgers were set to take on the Boston Red Sox.

Coming into the postseason, the Red Sox held the best regular season record in the Majors with 108 wins and 54 losses. They defeated the New York Yankees in four games in the ALDS and later went on to beat the Houston Astros in the ALCS in five games.

The Los Angeles Dodgers went 92-17 in the regular season. They defeated the Colorado Rockies in a tie-breaker game for the National League West Division, winning their division. The Dodgers went on to beat the Atlanta Braves in four games and the Milwaukee Brewers in a seven game series to win the National League Championship Series.

With home field advantage, the Series began in Boston at Fenway Park on 23 October 2018. Star pitcher Chris Sale (Boston) battled Clayton Kershaw (LA) in game one. The Red Sox topped the Dodgers by a score of 8-4, with Sale getting the win.

Game two was also hosted by the Red Sox at Fenway Park, pitting pitchers David Price (Boston) against the Dodgers' Hyun-jin Ryu. The Red Sox came out on top once again by a score of 4-2, with runs scored by J.D. Martinez, Ian Kinsler, and Steve Pierce for the Red Sox, and Manny Machado and Matt Kemp for the Dodgers. The Red Sox closed out the game with closer Craig Kimbrel, taking a two game lead in the series.

The series was then sent to Los Angeles. Game three was a pivotal part of the Series. The Red Sox had a chance to take a commanding three-game lead, while the Dodgers needed a win to keep their hopes alive. A long game ensued, lasting eighteen innings, a total

of seven hours and twenty minutes. Both teams exhausted their bullpens and relief players, but the Dodgers came out with the victory after Max Muncy hit a walk-off home run in the bottom of the eighteenth inning, giving the Dodgers the 3-2 win.

Game four went on the following day, with players still sore from the previous night. The Dodgers took a 4-0 lead in the sixth inning, but they're momentum from the win the day before proved to be short-lived. The Red Sox scored eight runs in the following three innings, giving them an 8-4 win and a 3-1 lead in the World Series

With all of the momentum shifted back to the Red Sox, and with a chance to win it all in Game five, the Red Sox started out hot with a two-run home run by Steve Pearce. The Dodgers tried to rebound, but only scored a single run on a lead-off home run by David Freese. The Red Sox later tacked on an additional three runs through three separate homeruns by Mookie Betts, J.D. Martinez, and, once again, Steve Pierce. Red Sox pitcher Chris Sale closed out the game by striking out All-Star Manny Machado to win the 2018 World

"They might be the best team ever," senior Reece Fenstermacher said. "They won 110 plus games, and it seems like they pretty much dominated the playoffs. No teams really scared them, and no teams could really compete with them."

Steve Pearce won the 2018 World Series MVP Award after hitting three home runs in the World Series. The Red Sox celebrated with a huge parade in Boston.

Fleetwood Grads Inducted into Hall of Fame

were inducted into the Fleetwood Sports Hall of Fame on 27 December. The ceremony included opening remarks from Superintendent Dr. Greg Miller followed by a guest speaker, Dale Cullin. The three alumni were then inducted and introduced before the boys' basketball game in the gymnasium.

The selection committee consists of President Charlie Young, secretary/treasurer Jeff Wolfe, other established Fleetwood alumni, as well as athletic director Matt Diehl. They get together each year and vote on new inductees.

Chris Unger went to Fleetwood from 1985-1990. He earned a total of ten varsity letters

Chris Unger, Dale Faust, and Barry Koch in four sports in his career. He played soccer, starting for two years, basketball starting for the same amount of time, track for four years, and baseball for a year. Unger once finished sixth in the 400-meter dash in the County meets, but he excelled in soccer and basketball.

> Unger won two Berks County championships, two District titles, and he played in the State Championship in 1989. Individually, he was an All-County selection in 1990. Chris won the District III title in basketball in 1990, the same year he was named All-County as a team captain.

Dale Faust, the next inductee, went to Fleetwood from 1962-1966. He earned nine varsity letters in three sports over the course of his

career. He played soccer, basketball, and baseball.

In soccer, Faust was an All-County honorable mention goalie in 1964 and an All-County forward in '65. In 1966, Faust was the leading scorer in Berks County Eastern Basketball Division, finishing third in the entire county.

Dale Faust also excelled in baseball. He was the first pitcher in school history to win 20 games, winning 23 in his career. He was an All-County selection in 1965 for pitcher and outfielder and again as a pitcher in 1966. He won two county championships as well in 1964 and 1966.

Barry Koch, the final inductee, attended Fleetwood from 1972-1974. He earned nine varsity letters in three sports in his career, winning Fleetwood Outstanding Male Athlete in 1976.

Barry Koch started four years of baseball three in soccer, and two in basketball. He was an All-County honorable mention for soccer and a very solid basketball player. Baseball, however, was where he stood out. Starting all four years, Koch was All-County in 1974 and 1976, winning the team MVP in '75 and '76. He won three division championships from '74-'76. Barry was named to 1970's Reading Eagle's Baseball First Team and Reading Eagle's All-Decades fourth

Koch went on to play college baseball at Mesa Community College, where he earned All-Conference and NJCAA Southwest District first honors in 1980. He won the regional championship at Mesa C.C., placing 5th at the NJCAA World Series. He then transferred to Arizona State University, where he won an NCAA World Series in 1981. Koch went on to be drafted by the Milwaukee Brewers in 1982.

All three inductees had storied careers at Fleetwood, well deserving of their spot in the Fleetwood Sports Hall of Fame.

Ray Tracing for Video Game Animation Has Arrived for All

Modern day animations have photo realistic lighting due to a rendering method called Ray Tracing. What Ray Tracing does is it traces a path of light as pixels to generate an image based on the surfaces the light comes into contact with. When the ray of light hits a surface, it reflects, refracts, scatters, creates dispersion, and shadows without the need of an engine to tell it to what to do. This in turn simulates light identical to how light works anywhere in the universe. If you are still having a difficult time understanding, think of it as a reversed eyeball. Light is perceived and emitted from the surface as opposed to a light source. Then lighting calculations go from there. As light bounces off of more surfaces, the greater the detail gets. Ray Tracing has all of the advantages that other rendering methods do not have except for one, speed.

Rendering frames with Ray Tracing takes a lot of computing power and time. On a high end workstation, a single frame can take up to a day to render. This is why Ray Tracing never made it into games until late 2018. In competitive games where every frame, millisecond, and even server tick count, low frame rate is detrimental. Now with Nvidia's new line of GPUs, real time Ray Tracing can be supported in games and animating with Ray Tracing is more practical than ever. Or is it?

Nvidia's new line of GPUs is titled RTX. As of the third quarter of 2018 all the way until January 2019, the time this article was written, not that many games have a Ray Tracing feature. If Ray Tracing was something you didn't care about, RTX has something called DDLS which stands for Deep Learning Super Sampling. DDLS provides Anti-Aliasing up to 64x for the smoothest way to render the edges of objects and plains. It does this by running the game or animation at a higher resolution than your monitor. then outputs it at its native resolution. There is a catch; not many games and programs have DDLS support. Nvidia plans to help developers get Ray Tracing and DDLS support via driver updates.

The cost of the RTX cards is not pleasant. The RTX 2080 comes in at \$799 and the RTX 2080ti comes in at \$1199. When the cards are in use, expect them to pull more than 300 watts of power. Upgrading the average 500 watt power supply in most desktop and gaming sta-

RTX cards have a tremendous amount of potential, but not that much practicality. If you have the money to spare, get one because support for Ray Tracing and DDLS will phase in over the next few months or years. Other than that, there is nothing wrong with holding off.

Jamie Lynn Closs Escapes Kidnapper after 3 Months

On 15 October 2018, the whole world changed for one little girl.

Jayme Lynn Closs, thirteen-years-old, went missing. When police officers arrived on scene, they found Jayme's parents shot to death in their home located in Barron, Wisconsin

Her father's name was James Closs, and he was fifty-six-years-old. Her mother's name was Denise Closs, and she was forty-

On 10 January 2019, brave Jayme Closs escaped from her kidnapper's house; his name is twenty-one-year-old Jake Thom-

As of now, Patterson is facing murder and kidnapping charges. The public does not have any information on Jayme's mental or physical state right now. Her aunt, Kelly Engelhardt, told Fox News they are "not asking" Jayme questions at the moment.

While searching Patterson's house, police found a shotgun that is consistent with the firearm used on 15 October to shot through Jayme's front door.

After investigation, Patterson provided more information. He said he spotted Jayme for the first time after he stopped behind a school bus on Highway 8. Patterson also stated that there was no rhyme or reason for taking Closs; she was just the girl

As of now, he is charged with two counts of first-degree intentional homicide, a count of kidnapping, and one of burglary. He appeared in court, and his bail was set at five million dollars in cash.

Patterson visited the Closs house twice before the date of the murders and kidnapping but was scared off by people and lights. He even went as far as shaving his head so he would not leave any DNA evi-

The night of the kidnapping, Jayme said she heard her dogs barking and woke up. She then went to her parents' room and her father went downstairs, where he was shot by Patterson. Meanwhile, Jayme and her mother were in the upstairs bathroom, where they dialed 911. When Patterson tound them, her mother hung up the phone and was forced to duct tape her daughter's mouth. Her mother was then shot.

Patterson stuck Jayme in the trunk of his car and drove away. She said she could hear the sirens, but it was too late.

On 10 January, Patterson told Jayme that he was going to be away for at least five hours; this is the day she knew it was time to get out. She crawled out of the bed, pushed the weights off them, put on shoes, and ran out to the middle of the road.

"I do not believe in the death penalty. It is way too expensive and takes forever; he deserves life in prison without parole. He is definitely unstable. This was planned; his purpose was to go into the house and get the girl," Fleetwood Area High School English teacher Debra Mahnken stated.

Woman in Vegetative State Gives Birth

A woman who had been in a vegetative state for over a decade has given birth to a healthy baby boy. The woman's identity has not yet been reported. She nearly drowned 14 years ago, leaving her in a permanent vegetative state. She now depends on around-the-clock care at Hacienda Healthcare in Arizona.

The staff was reportedly unaware of her pregnancy until she went into labor on 29 December of last year. Staff members allegedly found her moaning in her room and realized she was in active labor. Because of this, the quality of care at Hacienda Healthcare is in question, and the Phoenix Police Department has launched a sexual assault investigation.

Hacienda Healthcare has said they will get to the bottom of this. Until then, state regulators have requested better safety measures. Male employees must now be accompanied by another staff member while treating female patients.

This case has caused outrage online. Women's advocates are questioning why authori-

ties are treating it as a possible sexual assault case rather than an outright rape, seeing as the victim obviously couldn't consent or defend herself, and she couldn't report any inappropriate behavior. They want DNA from the baby to establish who the biological father is.

Local gynecologist Dr. Greg Marchard explained that the woman was not able to push. The facility's lack of awareness also prevented safe intervention.

"It could have been an active labor for hours or even days. This easily could have resulted in fetal death," one representative said.

Hacienda Healthcare has released a statement saying, "while federal and state privacy laws prohibit us from publicly discussing a patient's health or ease, Hacienda has and will continue to cooperate fully with law enforcement and all the relevant regulatory agencies regarding this matter."


2019 – Year of the Egg
