the front from years back, when one of the band members threw a pie crust filled with whipped cream at the curtain. The school decided that red



Students Take Trip to NYC to Learn about Berlin Wall

Fleetwood German teacher Ms. Christine Moll and her students went on a trip to the Consulate General of Germany

They went on 6 November, and the group learned about the history of the Berlin Wall.

It was the thirtieth anniversary of the fall of the Berlin Wall.

In the night from 12 August to 13

August 1961, East German border police in Berlin began tearing up streets, building barricades with the stones, and putting up barbed-wire barriers across the

They built a three-meter -high, impregnable wall around West Berlin.

The construction of the Wall meant that the eastern part of Berlin was completely cut off from the western part.

German students visited the Consulate General of Germany in New York City with Moll.

Their day began with an

informal lecture about the history of the Berlin Wall.

After that, they viewed the photo exhibit, "A World Beyond the Wall," which documents life during the time the wall

The group walked to Bryant Park for lunch and shopping at the Winter Village. They went to Times Square, and they split up into two groups and rode the sub-

way around the city for more shopping and sightseeing.

> "I just love being here, and I'm ad to go," sophomore Jay Molleca


"I wish we could do this once a nonth," senior Owen Magers said "Definitely worth the trip! I learned a lot about the fall of the wall and life in East Germany,"

Fleetwood Students Donate at Blood Drive

On 16 October, students of the Fleetwood Area High School had the opportunity to donate blood for this year's Fall Blood Drive.

For over ten years now, students ages sixteen and up are able to donate a pint of blood to Miller-Keystone, where it will then go to people who are in need of blood.

School nurse Ms. Alicia Seaman, along with Chemistry teacher Ms. Neiman, were in charge of organizing the drives.

"I donated because I know it's going to help other people," sophomore Kayley Henninger said.

The process of donating blood is relatively simple. First, questions are asked about health and travel to assess a person's risk for disease. Then a mini physical checks pulse, weight, height, blood pressure, and hematocrit, the level of hemoglobin or red blood cells. Once a student passes the screening, he or she is then able to donate.

The process of taking the blood only takes about five to ten minutes, and the student is then able to enjoy a snack and make sure his or her body adjusts to the small loss of blood.

For anyone who wishes to avoid a reaction when giving blood, there are tips to help.

"During this time, the donor squeezes a ball to keep the blood flowing. Moving your feet keeps your blood pressure

up and can help avoid reactions," Neiman

Overall, the Fall Blood Drive was a success, and ninety-three units of blood were collected.

For anyone who wishes to donate but missed this chance, another blood drive will be held on 30 January 2020.

Some of the more important information is that the games were officially released on 15 November and cost \$59.99.

Just like in the previous generation of Sun and Moon, the games Sword and Shield have their own variants called Galarian.

In the new generation, your choice of starters are the fire type, Scorbunny; the water type, Sobble; or the grass type, Grookey. While each Pokemon only have their base evolutions announced, it will only be a matter of time before the full evolution line is introduced.

Williamson's Regular Season Debut Delayed from Injury

Zion Williamson, the 2019 number one draft pick, has suffered an injury during the preseason that will have him out for the first six to eight weeks of the NBA season.

His athleticism is what sparked the public interest in him, dating all the way back to high school. Since then, he has faced some injuries, leaving some to wonder if health will be an issue in the NBA.

Zion is a highly anticipated, but also very criticized, rookie coming into the 2019-20

The biggest obstacle for him is staying healthy. Some of his injuries date back to AAU ball, when he suffered a knee contusion after a hard fall during warm-ups that caused him to miss a few months

Knee injuries continued as he suffered a Grade 1 right knee sprain while attending Duke University.

Then, nine minutes into his Summer League debut, he suffered a bruised knee after

colliding with another player and was ruled out for the remainder of the Summer League.

After being sidelined with right knee soreness during the preseason, he was evaluated with a torn meniscus that, after surgery, would leave him out for about 6-8 weeks.

This news was made public after a successful surgery, the day before the NBA regular season started.

Many of his fans were upset with this news but remained hopeful for his return.

"He is a beast. I hope he can bounce back from this injury and have a great rookie year," senior Mamadou Jalloh said.

"I have been watching video clips of him since he was in high school. He's freakishly athletic for his size. It will be fun watching him once he recovers," senior Conor Steward said.

The Pelicans' vice president said that Zion was doing very well, and he believes his recovery will be very smooth.
